men's health	Men's Health and health for people assigned male at birth (AMAB)	AMAB is an acronym denoting individuals who were assigned male at birth; the use of this term facilitates a gender-inclusive and anatomical approach to delivering healthcare (i.e. not all people with a prostate identify as a man)
men, women	people, person	maintains gender neutrality and inclusivity
his/her	one's, their	maintains gender neutrality and inclusivity
maternity care	conception and birthing	conception and birthing care may be delivered to individuals who do not
