Clinical Assessment

Doves versus Hawks effect: Hawks have very high standards and mark more stringently, while doves tend to be more lenient

Project

Choice of evidence-based or advocacy project
Requirement to achieve credit: Must be satisfactory

Entrustable Professional Activities (EPAs):
12 EPAs or clinical skills that are expected of a graduating medical student.

EPAs

Halo effect: Cognitive bias in which your impression of a person impacts your expectations of that person in other domains

Case logs

Encounters and procedures required for the rotation
Requirement to achieve credit: Must be completed

Domains: Altruism, Reliability and Responsibility, Self-Improvement, Respect for Others, Honour and Integrity
Requirement to achieve credit: Must be satisfactory

Professionalism Form

Rotation 1 vs 6 clerks:
Students early in clerkship should be assessed differently than those who have completed many prior rotations.

CRITICAL INCIDENT REPORTS:

- ★ To address situations where a student has put a patient or someone else at significant risk because of their behaviour, or when a student has engaged in conduct unbecoming of a physician in training
- ★ Can be made by a teacher, other learner, university or hospital staff member
